

Expulsion from Preschool Can Create Lasting Struggles

Children in preschools are expelled at 5 times the rate of children in kindergarten and higher grades. Many of the protections for older children don't exist for preschoolers. Removal at this age has a critical impact on a child's relationship to school in general and can cause lifelong learning problems. A good experience in preschool can create a lifelong love of learning and success.

Our Child Care Solutions Program (CCS) Helps Children at Risk

We Care provides mental health consultation to preschools throughout Contra Costa County. Supported by First 5 Contra Costa, our innovative and collaborative CCS program helps reduce expulsion by assisting teachers and parents to better address challenging behaviors of preschoolers - even long after we've left.


This Story is One of Hundreds from our Program

"Mark" was a smart and friendly little boy when not upset, but he needed ongoing support to cope and focus throughout the 3-hour morning. He was frequently emotional, angry, sad, and easily upset by

disappointment. He could also be impulsive and aggressive in his interactions with others. His teacher told us that "Mark is very frustrated, has angry outbursts, and has difficulty at circle-time and during transitions. What we're doing doesn't seem to be helping."

Observations, Assessments, and Interactions

After she was brought in. We Care's consultant met frequently with Mark's teacher to discuss his behaviors and what they might mean. With each layer of information, the consultant developed new interpretations and interventions to support Mark in the classroom. Mark responded well to the support, reminders and limits, but he was not able to sustain this behavior without continual 1:1 attention.

Sometimes he would just come to school in a "bad" mood. Those were hard days for him and nothing seemed to make things right. For the classroom, this was unsustainable and he remained at risk for expulsion.

Family's Stresses Impacted Mark

After repeated efforts, we were finally able to connect with Mark's mother and learned that multiple stressors at home were likely **the cause of his behavior**. Health concerns among family members and financial difficulties that threatened their housing made it difficult for Mark's mom to focus on her son's needs and treatment.

Through a referral to **We Care's Wraparound program***, our team partnered with her to set achievable goals that included carving out one-on-one time with Mark to reduce his fear and isolation. Through goal-setting and support, our team also helped address employment concerns, and created a bridge between the family and the preschool. A plan for Mark was put into place that included behavior modification and opportunities for more appropriate expressions of his emotions. Between changes in his school environment and the level of pressure at home, risk of expulsion was decreased dramatically.

Mark Graduated to Kindergarten

Mark's improvements ensured he could graduate from his preschool and he is now thriving in kindergarten. The skills both he and his family learned from our programs have helped them weather many difficulties. They have **fundamentally changed the way they address problems**, which is continuing to pave Mark's path for ongoing success in school.

*Our Wraparound program provides a family-driven, team-based planning process that is individualized and coordinated to meet the goals of children and their families with complex needs. Each family is provided a team Facilitator as well as a Family Partner to aid in advocacy and peer support.



Our Heartfelt Thanks to John Muir Employees




We want to convey our heartfelt thanks to the nearly 150 extraordinarily generous John Muir Health System employees who helped us create the Liv and Hannah Love Fund.

The fund will provide much-needed help for many children and we are incredibly grateful for the kindness of all involved.


