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Maddox Flourished Beyond Boundaries

At home with his family, three-year-old Maddox was in his element. He was energetic, interactive, and engaging. His smile lit up the room. But after spending most of his young life isolated due to the pandemic, he was shy and uncomfortable in social situations. Maddox's family knew it was important for him to be with children his age in a safe environment that understood his unique abilities as a child diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder.

So they turned to his regional case manager who recommended We Care's Beyond Boundaries program for toddlers with autism or who are at risk for autism. At first, Maddox's family was hesitant due to the distance. But after a tour of the classroom and meeting several staff members, they decided it seemed like the perfect opportunity to increase Maddox's socialization and structure.

Maddox immediately felt a connection with his teachers Masako and Maria.

When Maddox's mom would take him to the classroom and he turned to wave goodbye with a smile on his face, her heart would fill with happiness. The same little boy who used to carefully back away when children would approach him at a park was now joyfully interacting with other toddlers.

And on Fridays when they would spend time on the playground with We Care's preschoolers, Masako would report back that Maddox was "running right up to the big kids to say hi!"

Maria and Masako would not only share daily photos of Maddox learning and playing, they would also provide insightful updates on his transitioning moods and needs. This empathetic touch reassured his family that Maddox was in an environment that met his needs in the way that worked best for him.

Maddox flourished during his time with We Care.

Now able to actively voice his wants, his communication has drastically improved. His family can interact with him on a deeper level and be more responsive as a result of his increased ability to express himself. They especially love the clean-up routine that carried over from the classroom and into the home!

Maddox also became a leader. His innate empathy enabled him to tune into the needs of other children, and he would be the first to run and help another child who he noticed was struggling.



The socialization and positive reinforcement he received at We Care have allowed Maddox's independent and humorous personality to shine through. His athleticism and love of adventure were nurtured, and his family often finds him scootering around, kicking a soccer ball, or swinging his small golf clubs like a pro.

Maddox has now graduated from Beyond Boundaries, and while Maria, Masako, his classmates and everybody at We Care will greatly miss him, we are exceptionally proud of the progress he's made and the incredible person he is. His family

is thrilled that his early start with We Care put him on the right path toward being his most authentic self, and they are overjoyed to see all the exciting opportunities that await him in his bright future.
